American Youth Soccer Organization (AYSO) Region 697

Dan Jordan knew nothing about soccer back in 2000 when he started volunteering for AYSO as the assistant coach for his daughter's soccer team. Who could have imagined that he would still be an AYSO volunteer today, 15 years later! Dan has served as an AYSO Coach, Division Coordinator, Referee Administrator, Assistant Regional Commissioner and Regional Commissioner. He's also used his home as an AYSO storage locker, served as a registration day worker, been the lost-and-found keeper, ball-blower-upper and more among his many, many AYSO tasks.

AYSO is a recreational soccer league in which everyone who wants to play, can play. The only requirements are interest and enthusiasm, and Dan has applied those same requirements to his volunteering. Dan has given enourmous energy and countless hours towards running and improving youth soccer in Oak Park. Under his watchful eye, the league has grown to over 1,700 kids, the largest youth league in town, and on any given Saturday in the fall there are over 80 games being played by kids ages 6-18. And, with his guidance, we've added a spring league which serves over 800 soccer-loving youth of Oak Park.

In addition to the number of kids playing soccer, the number of kids who are refereeing games has grown. Dan has formalized the referee training and scheduling for AYSO. This has had a positive impact on the quality of the soccer experience and given the youth referees a skill they can use later in life. Lastly, Dan has worked closely with the Park District. He supported the Irving School project, attended many Park District planning meetings, and was often seen lining fields.

The Park District is happy to have the opportunity to thank Dan for everything he has done to further soccer in our community - from taking that first step as an assistant coach to serving as AYSO Regional Commissioner and everything in between. Dan has made a lasting impact on AYSO, in our parks, and on the community of Oak Park.
